BACKGROUND

SUMMARY

Michigan implemented a naloxone standing order in 2017. It allowed people to get naloxone, a drug that can reverse an opioid overdose, at participating pharmacies without a prescription.

The community survey was part of a policy evaluation of the standing order. It assessed public awareness, attitudes, and actions about opioids and naloxone.

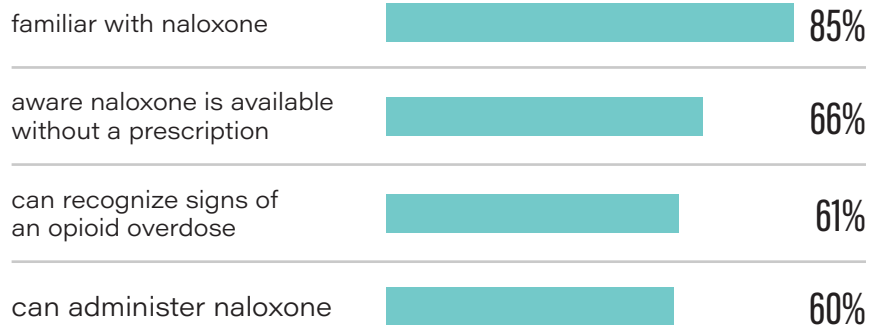

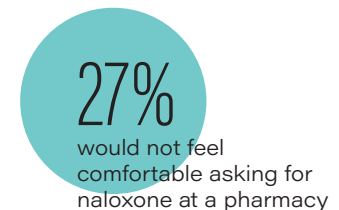
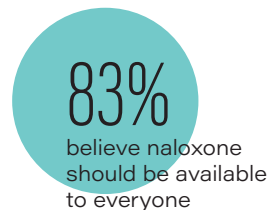
